

As we approach the holiday season, we are mindful of some positive and remarkable events of this year and can be grateful for each and every moment which rekindles the fires of grace...

On October 25th we celebrated the 154th Anniversary of the Foundation of the Congregation of the Sisters of Charity of the Incarnate Word, who were called into being by Bishop Claude Marie Dubuis in 1866 with the following memorable words: "Our Lord Jesus Christ, suffering in the persons of a multitude of sick and infirm of every kind, seeks relief at your hands." The Sisters' dedication to this ministry continues, ever mindful of what that call means in light of the signs of our times.

On **August 26** we celebrated the **97**th **Anniversary of the dedication of St. Mary**, when six of the CCVI Sisters began their ministry in Long Beach. SMMC evolved from a facility which focused on health and wellness to one whose care changed to meet the expanding needs of the community.

Earlier this year, the St. Mary Medical Center **(SMMC) Foundation** began the celebration of its **50**th **year of operation**. It was begun during the Administration of Sr. Wilfred Shorten, CCVI on the recommendation of the Sisters of Charity of the Incarnate Word. At the time of its establishment, the Foundation was asked to raise money for many programs, among them "facility expansion, medical education and patient care services."

Throughout the last five decades, the Foundation has been sensitive to and mindful of the needs of the hospital in its outreach, and in its unique services to diverse populations in and around Long Beach. The Foundations continues to answer the Sisters' original call to minister to those suffering and vulnerable people in our midst.

St. Mary has always delivered excellent quality care with the utmost compassion, living the core values of the organization as it makes the mission known! With the financial assistance and support of the Foundation, the hospital can be sure to continue and grow services, extend its technological reach, provide the most up-to-date equipment to address needs of this century and prepare for a future of hope.




Return on Investment (ROI)

1970-2020: Celebrating 50 Years of Inspired Philanthropy

2020 is certain to be year no one will ever forget.

Dignity Health – St. Mary Medical Center
planned to celebrate the five decades of support
our community has shown to the St. Mary
Medical Center Foundation with traditional
events and social gatherings. Despite our
celebration of this anniversary looking different,
our gratitude is greater than ever.



Charitable donations from our community and grateful patients play a vital role in providing our families, friends, and neighbors with access to high-quality, compassionate care and comprehensive healthcare services. Thanks to the generosity of thousands of individuals, businesses, and private foundations, St. Mary is able to make major investments in equipment, our facility, and our community benefit programs.

The COVID-19 Pandemic has been challenging, but one thing that has been evident throughout this unprecedented challenge is that St. Mary Medical Center is a strong pillar in Long Beach. We have received an overwhelming response from countless people in the community who just want to help our healthcare workers, as we continue to do everything we can to save lives.

Dozens of local restaurants have donated over 10,000 meals to feed our hospital staff. Area businesses have delivered care packages, including a former, grateful, pediatric patient who believes kindness towards others can make a real difference.

Private foundations have provided funding as the need arose to serve those in our community who were homebound due to compromised immune systems, including our CARE Center clients living with HIV who couldn't get to the store for essential items.

Individual generosity allowed staff, who didn't want to risk exposure to their families, a place to stay thanks to an anonymous cash donation that reserved the Broadlind Hotel in downtown Long Beach.

Additionally, St. Mary has had tremendous support from the Long Beach Department of Health, the City of Long Beach, Cal State Long Beach, the Long Beach Fire Department, and the Long Beach Police Department. Police and Fire personnel are typically seen as real-life heroes, but during the COVID-19 public health crisis, these heroes saluted our healthcare workers with a parade of emergency vehicles across our campus during National Hospital Week.

As St. Mary Medical Center Foundation marked its 50th Anniversary last year, although we could not celebrate with you, please know that we celebrate *because of you*.

1970-1980: The Formative Years

St. Mary Foundation was formed officially on December 18, 1970 by the recommendation of the Sisters of Charity of the Incarnate Word. The motion was made at the Regular meeting of the Board of Directors by Board President Sister Mary Wilfred Shorten who served as CEO in 1970 of what was then known as St. Mary's Long Beach Hospital. It was reflected in the minutes that "the objectives of St. Mary's Long Beach Hospital Foundation are to provide funds to be raised for the hospital's many programs, such as expansion, medical education, and patient care."

The Sisters of Charity and St. Mary Medical Center began a period of major fundraising to sustain the growth at St. Mary with the formation of the Foundation and the Foundation Board of Trustees which was first led by Board Chair John Wallace. A \$4 million gift from Modestus and Evalyn Bauer enabled St. Mary to build the Bauer Tower in 1974— a 10 story building that houses our acute care patient rooms, Pediatrics Unit, Emergency Department, Intensive Care Unit, Pathology Lab, Radiology Department and Newborn Nursery. This large expansion expanded the hospital to over 500 beds and enhanced St. Mary's surgical and radiologic capabilities.

Additional funds from the Bauer's in 1973 enabled St. Mary's to build the Bauer Professional Building at 1045 Atlantic Avenue which provides office space for physicians. In 1975, St. Mary Hospital was re-named St. Mary Medical Center to reflect the more comprehensive services of the campus. Additionally during this decade Dr. Orville Cole saw a growing need in the community for a program to serve those with visual impairments. In 1976, Dr. Orville Cole helped found the Low Vision Center which continues to serve thousands of children and adults in need of optical aids.

1980-1990: Continued Expansion

Additional transformational gifts were received by St. Mary Foundation in the 1980's which provided St. Mary the funding needed to continue to grow and expand the services and facilities on campus.

In 1982, the Parr Health Enhancement Center was completed in honor of John and Jane Parr, as well as the completion of the Medical Mall in 1984.

In 1985, the St. Mary Tower opened on Atlantic Avenue, offering 148 apartments for low income seniors and the handicapped. That same year, the Sisters of St. Mary also saw a need in the community to care for those affected by HIV and AIDS and founded the Comprehensive AIDS Resource Education (CARE) Center. The CARE Center is recognized a Leader in LGBTQ Healthcare Equality by the Human Rights Campaign and serves more than 1,600 people a year.

In 1987, the Southeast Asian Health Initiative was founded. Now known as Families in Good Health (FiGH) the program is a multillingual, multicultural health and social education program for the Southeast Asian, Latino and other communities.

This decade also marked the beginning of St. Mary's largest and most noteworthy fundraiser which was started by volunteer Sheila Hanley – The St. Mary Hospice Auction and Dinner helped raise over \$10 million dollars (net) revenue for St. Mary Medical Center and drew over 550 attendees annually.

1990-2000: A New Millennia

With the millennia approaching, the Foundation saw expansive growth in the 1990's. Since inception, the Foundation had thus far raised over \$16 million, but that number tripled to over \$54 million by the end of 1999. In 1993, a new fundraising event, the St. Mary Charity Golf Tournament, was founded by Vince Esposito, MD, who chaired the tournament for over 18 years. The Golf Tournament has raised over \$4 million dollars (net) to benefit the care provided at St. Mary Medical Center.

In 1998, St. Mary Medical Center and the Sisters of Charity of the Incarnate Word celebrated the 75th Anniversary of the founding of the Medical Center. In the three year anniversary campaign honoring the Sisters, St. Mary Foundation was able to raise over \$29 million which benefitted programs and capital improvements at the Medical Center

2000-2010: Riding the Waves of Success

Thanks in part to the success of the 75th Anniversary Campaign, the Medical Center campus was enhanced by various capital projects. During this decade these projects included: Henry & Marcella Poitras Cancer Research Center; Mr. Blackwell R. L. Spencer Cancer Center, and the Jim & Lorraine Ackerman Long Boulevard Entrance.

In 2003, Foundation Chair Gene Lentzner and Campaign Chair Bernie Jones led the 80th Anniversary Campaign which raised \$6.7 million to renovate patient rooms in the Bauer Tower. In 2006, the Women's Health Center was dedicated and named in honor of Sister Mary Sabina.

St. Mary Foundation continued to have tremendous success in raising funds, having raised \$55 million in this decade, doubling what was raised in the first three decades of the Foundation's inception.



2010-2020: Unprecedented Growth

St. Mary Foundation continued to experience significant growth throughout the most recent decade. With the sale of St. Mary Tower in 2016, a \$13 million endowment was created for a comprehensive care center which will provide holistic care for seniors. In 2011, the Mobile Unit was launched allowing St. Mary to improve access to care in the greater Long Beach community. In 2015, the Medical Center underwent a major, \$10 million, campus refresh, helping modernize patient care areas. In 2017, St. Mary Foundation concluded a capital campaign which raised \$9 million for the future expansion of emergency services. In 2020, St. Mary Medical Center was designated as a Comprehensive Stroke Center by LA County Emergency Medical Services. In spite of the many challenges brought on by the COVID-19 pandemic, St. Mary has been overwhelmed by community supporters who have provided over 300,000 in-kind items needed for COVID-19 equipment upgrades.
